

All cash proceeds will go to our local branch. Hoping you will all make good use of it, thanks,





Last weekend we celebrated William's birthday with a party at Mistly Place Park. Have you been there? It is a tremendous destination for all boys - big or small - lots of mud, tractors, animals and other delights. This is an animal rescue centre with lots of other attractions. Some days there are remote controlled car races. There is a maze and a woodland walk with a huge lake surrounded by picnic benches if you want to take your own food, or you can go to the Tea Rooms where a large choice of freshly cooked food - meals, snacks, drinks etc., is served with a smile. We took twelve children and four adults for the party, and spent ninety minutes exploring the grounds before going to the Tea Rooms for a previously booked meal. The staff could not have been more helpful; even organising my homemade birthday cake with candles and frill. Pony rides rounded off the outing. Thanks to all those who gave me comments on the last Anglia T.V. programmes I had to review.


On September 14th I met the producer responsible for all the Anglia Quiz shows. If anyone is interested in being part of any audience please let me know.




Harvest Festival
