FROM EARL RALPH TO HARRY HARWOOD

After the Norman Invasion of 1066, King William appointed Squires, mainly Norman French, all over the country, to look after his interests and to supply men and horses in time of war.

The squire would be granted land within the parish and most parishioners worked for him. There was little other option.

In Tuddenham according to the proceedings of The Suffolk Institute of Archaeology and Natural History, 1848, the Saxon *Thane Edric* gave way to the Norman, *Earl Ralph* who in turn created three sub manors within the parish held by such romantically named characters as *Roger de Poitou*, *Hervey de Bourges* and *Roger de Rheims*. Two were *Loudham Hall* (probably the present Manor Farm), *Bertilmewes* (probably Tuddenham Hall) and another unknown; my guess being that it could have been *Porch Cottages + Tudor Cottages*.

These positions were passed down in various ways; perchance, marrying the right girl, etc., through nine hundred years until the last squire died in 1927.

There are still people in the village who remember this tall, reserved, well respected man, *Henry Fairfax*

Harwood. He was a benefactor of both Church and Chapel. When he died he left one pound to every school child in the village and I know of two Post Office Savings' Books which contain that original entry.

When we first came to Tuddenham in 1961 there was an elderly lady, *Mrs. "Geranium" Smy*, living at *Geranium Cottage*, in *The Street*, who spoke with shining eyes of HER squire! Henry, or Harry, as he was known within the family, was engaged as a young man, to his cousin, *Ellen Goddard*, but she died young, and he, sadly, remained a lifelong bachelor.

Quiet and unassuming, he is said to have avoided social occasions. Nevertheless, "He had a quiet sense of humour and a charming manner."

Even well into the 20th Century he owned much of the village as follows:- a substantial amount of land, *The Hall*, the bailiff's house, *Park Corner Houses*, sand pit (*Bottom's Farm*) two cottages on the site of the present *Hill Farm*, *Fynn View*, *Hillside*, 39 cottages along *The Street*, the *Blacksmith's forge and workshops*, two cottages opposite *The Hall* entrance, two houses on *Grundisburgh Road/Clopton Road* junction, *Badger's Hill*, the corn mill (site of *The Granaries*), *The Fountain*

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(surprisingly), Bridge Cottages and The Old Vicarage.

Until 1926 he owned The Chapel as he was a convinced Non-Conformist preacher. In that year he gave the building to the Suffolk Congregational Union. A memorial tablet inside reads

"In grateful memory of Henry Fairfax Harwood, J.P. of Tuddenham Hall, who for forty years worshipped in this Church, and as teacher and leader, gave himself with unceasing devotion to the people, in the love and service of Christ."

Remarkably, he had three simultaneous funeral services:- at Tacket Street Chapel, Ipswich, at Tuddenham St. Martin Church, (C.of E.) and the main one, at Ipswich Cemetery Chapel, where the last Squire of Tuddenham was laid to rest in January, 1927.

As far as I know, the new comer at The Hall, *Mr. Arthur Rust Hunt*, had no wish to be known as the squire. He was a well known local farmer and dairyman and he got on with that.

Squire Harwood's death signalled the break-up of feudal Tuddenham as was happening everywhere in rural England. Being a squire had its rewards but the old responsibilities were becoming irrelevant to life in the 20th Century.

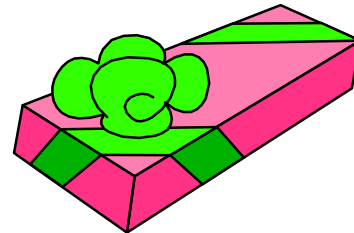

Peace in Green Fields...

... continuing the article from our Feb. issue, written by Linda Sanderson.

As for the Tuddenham St. Martin ghost.... well, we may have heard him.... but in all due honesty, didn't stay long enough to see him.

My friend, Pamela Seedon (who used to live with her family in one of Thicknesse Cottages) and I had heard that a figure resembling a monk would appear from the Vestry, during the hours of dusk, and walk to the large Bible. Here he would stand for a few seconds then simply return from whence he came. Being inquisitive children, we decided to start a vigil and proceeded to frequent the Church at suitable times parking ourselves in the very back pew, not because of the "being noticed factor" but moreso to have easy access to the back door, should escape be eminent! Anyway, on one occasion, and I hasten to say, the last occasion, amidst the undulating silence of the Church, the distinctive click of the Vestry door happened and footsteps did apparently seem to follow. But, unfortunately our stability was relinquished and nerves prevailed and we exited extremely quickly - so who knows? We never returned at dusk again.

I remember the Sunday School, which my Mother helped with occasionally and the little religiously pictured stamps you were given to add to your little books after attendance.

One of the most important tasks which my Grandfather was entrusted with - at least I felt it was the most important then - was the winding of the Church clock. This was regularly done and I was often allowed to assist with this. The thick stone stairs seemed to go on for ever then.

Bell ringing was an enjoyable occasion and I can remember my family with other friends from Tuddenham visiting many surrounding villages to sound the friendly bells in their Churches whilst Tuddenham, in turn,

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entertained many return visits.

I remember the little sweet shop at the foot of the hill near the front entrance of the Church and buying twopenneth of boiled sweets which were beautifully wrapped in little white bags and I remember my Grandfather Percy taking me into the Post Office - then a little building joined onto the left-hand side of The Fountain Inn. Here, he would buy me a penny worth of locust beans which were chewable and delicious.

Another memory is being given half a crown to go to Mrs. Welham at the Manor Farm and going over the Tuddenham bridge where my Grandfather had taken rapid shelter from a stray German plane during the war which had tried to target him. This bridge probably saved his life. The half crown was part payment for a can of milk for one fetched one's own milk then.

Then the Harvest times when sandwiches were packed and a whole day was spent in the warm sun watching harvest take place; quite an event then and such a happy occasion. Much hard work but a fruitful result which provided abundant Harvest Festivals.
