It was a very sad day, the day we lost our village character, but how greatly he will be missed. Dotsie was always ready to offer a helping hand and could do most odd jobs people asked him to do.

He spent most of his life in Tuddenham with two years in the Royal Navy and went as a stockman for Major Norman Everett. After a few years the Major sold his farm so Dotsie went into the building trade.

In the later years Dotsie bought a moped and was often seen riding through the village with his shooting bag over his shoulder, as he was always going after rabbits to feed his ferrets.

Many years ago Dotsie lost a ferret and, as one knows, you do not admit to losing a ferret for they will kill chickens and ducks, etc. However this ferret went missing at around mid-day and after hours of searching for the ferret Dotsie gave up at about five o'clock. Nearer to eight o'clock that evening Dusty Millar, who lived in the village, knocked on Dotsie's door and asked him if he would kill a ferret for him as it had killed some of his chickens. So Dotsie calmly went and collected it and told Dusty Millar he would keep the ferret for himself rather

than kill it.

He was always ready to give advice to people about what to grow and when to plant produce in their garden and ready to help if anyone had moles on their lawns.

After his day's work had finished he used to like to walk to the Tuddenham Fountain and have a drink and a chat with his mates.

Later years he enjoyed going to car boot sales where he would buy a bargain, namely garden tools and equipment.

This last two years he joined the Tuddenham Carpet Bowls Club where he spent many enjoyable evenings playing bowls and he was getting to be a very good player.

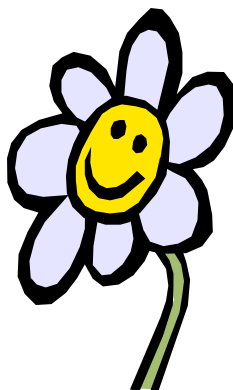

MORE ST. MARTIN PICTURES.

Just before Christmas we visited the Royal Academy in Piccadilly for the Van Dyck exhibition of portraits and compositions which was most exciting. Very varied and full of rich, strong colour. We were thrilled and amazed to come across a large oil painting of St. Martin dividing his cloak, painted in 1620. He is on a huge grey charger in armour cutting his scarlet cloak and giving half to the beggar. If anyone would like to see the picture I would be glad to show them. I have written to the Royal Academy to ask if I could reproduce the picture for people to use as notelets in the village but I do not think I shall be allowed to do this.

The catalogue also shows a similar depiction of St. Martin dividing his cloak by Peter Paul Rubens in 1612.

The First President of the Women's Institute?

I spent a very interesting evening last week, the only male among twenty or thirty local women gathered in the village hall to hear about the Romans in Suffolk. I was there by kind invitation of the Tuddenham Women's Institute who were to be addressed by Ms. J. Plouvier, one of the County's senior archaeologists.

The talk was fascinating not only for its content, which is of particular interest to me, but because I could not imagine a similar group of men organising themselves in such a way.

Then I remembered that I *had* attended a few gatherings of men who met to discuss and show the various artefacts they had found in Suffolk soil over the previous few months with their metal detectors. It is rather like fishing, a solitary business. Not many women would want to do it, though perhaps it would not be wise.

However, enough of the psychology. Ms. Plouvier produced a magnificent set of slides which showed how the Romans, in 400 years, had come to dominate this country, yet who gave us so much. They built more than 6000 miles of fine roads, some of which are still in use, ports, towns, villas and great defensive walls. They gave us good drainage, central heating and hot public baths which we did not enjoy again until late Victorian times. We had law, order and peace, warmth, food and some culture even if this was a pale reflection of the scene in Rome.

When, finally, they withdrew, in 410 AD the British thought themselves as good Romans as any. To be a citizen of the Roman Empire was certainly was to be raised in status, far above barbarians elsewhere. But being an East Anglian, I am secretly rather

proud that our small tribal groups stood up to these invaders and rebelled ferociously against their foreign ways and arrogance.

After 17 years of Roman rule Boudicca, Queen of the Iceni, had had enough. She led the assault on Colchester, London and St. Albans and burned these important centres to the ground. Tacitus, the Roman historian, stated, with surprise, "They do not discriminate against women in military command." Unfortunately the tactics of this charismatic woman were unsound and her army was annihilated.

Roman Britain prospered for almost another 400 years. We find signs of them locally in Felixstowe, Ipswich, Coddham, Hacheston and even Tuddenham where evidence of settlement had been found along the South facing slopes of the Fynn Valley, including a hoard of coins and a small statuette of Bacchus, one of the Roman gods.

As for Boudicca, no one knows what happened to her. I don't know the origins of the W.I. but she sounds as though she might well have had something to do with it!

Soup and Sweet

A very successful lunch was given by the Tuddenham W.I. on Saturday 9th April. It was extremely well attended, and the soups were excellent and the sweets (calorie loaded) were delicious. After the repast we were given a talk on the Helicopter Air Sea Rescue Service by a "winch man". He told us that flying these planes was a very skilled job which requires constant hours of practise. They are in the air all the time at a cost of £5000 per hour and cover great distances all over the country. The co-pilot is in touch with people on the ground and has to watch out for various hazards. The planes fly from 500 feet and can drop down to 50. There are medical supplies on board which the winch man is trained to use on any injured people who are rescued.

We saw very clear slides of him being lowered down with his harness on to help people from various situations. They certainly do a very worthwhile job.



Also, as an extra bonus to the day, the "W.I. Millennium Landscape Exhibition" was on show.

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St. Martin's News

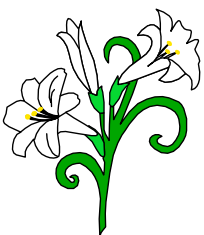
Easter over already!! Services were well attended, particularly on Easter morning, when we had an excellent turnout. The Rev. Sam Cowley introduced a new service to the Benefice this Easter – a “Dawn Communion” at 06.00 on Easter Morning. It was actually dark in Winesham Church when the service started making the symbolic candles quite necessary without the lights being switched on. It was a very moving service, albeit the numbers attending very small.

The installation of the internal tower window is now dependent on the artist, all the necessary “authorities” being in place. It is anticipated that the work will be commenced and completed during June and we look forward to viewing the final result of what has proved a long haul.

The hole created by a sub contractor's vehicle at the foot of Church Hill remains unrepaired. There is some dispute as to whether it is the responsibility of the builder who caused the damage or the County Council due to the poor quality of the surface in the first place. The builder has to return during the Summer to restore the church yard paths by which time the repair responsibility will have been resolved.

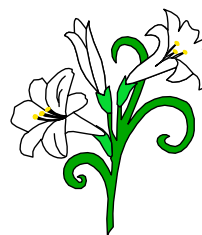

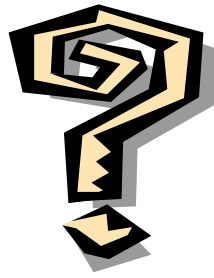
Move this page in a circular motion - each circle will appear to revolve on it's axis. The inner cog wheel will appear to rotate in the opposite direction.
