MILLENNIUM UPDATE

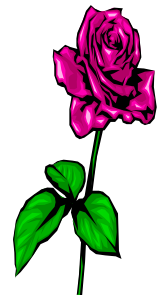
Get Well Soon

Amy North remains very poorly and we pass on our best wishes. Tony French visits regularly if anyone wants to pass on a message.



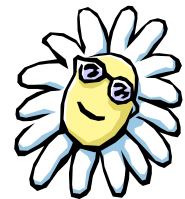
Tony's Mum, Vera, is still in Heath Road. Our thoughts are with her at this difficult time.

PLAY CLEAN!

Several residents have asked us to publicise the problem of dog mess on the playground. How can children run free in our lovely village when they are liable to come home with dog foul on their feet and even hands? If you see a dog loose on the playing field please locate the owner and tell them that exercising dogs there is unacceptable.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE MEETING

The main item dealt with was the question of replacement windows and estimates have been obtained for this work. The options were softwood, hardwood or PVC, with or without double glazing. Account has to be taken of several factors including loss of heat in cold weather, fire hazards, and excessive heat on hot Summer days, as the windows are all on the sunny side of the building.

Various details of maintenance were discussed, including the need to retreat the outside, wooden walls, replace rotting flash boards, paint the kitchen, and somehow banish the damp from the toilets. A recent case of a hirer failing to leave the hall clean and tidy was discussed and measures were taken to ensure that hirers who fail to exercise proper care, when using the building, face a financial penalty.

Damage to the car park surface is to be made good and a new drain installed to take away excess surface water. The floor is to be re-sanded and sealed.

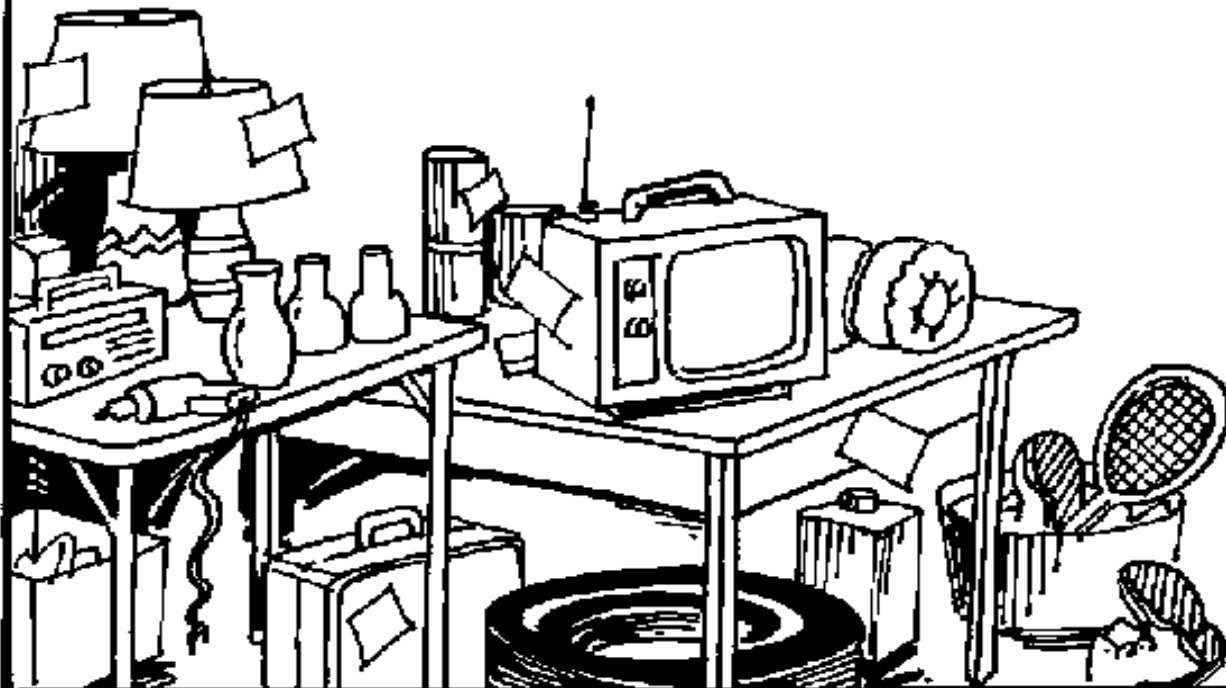

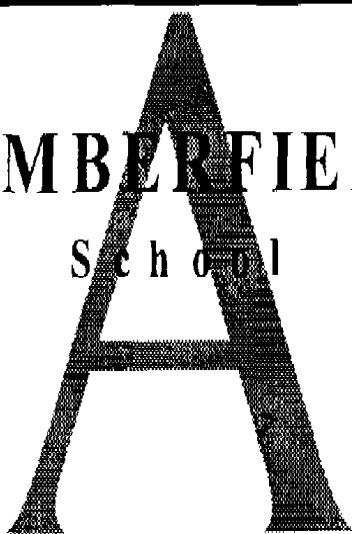

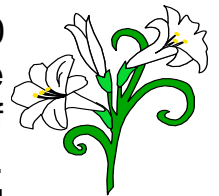

It is intended that there will be an **Evensong Service on 17th September** at which both the South Porch alterations and the window will be blessed and dedicated by the Bishop. **The Harvest Festival Service will be held at 9.30am on the same day.** Everyone is welcome at these two services.

The Harvest Lunch is on 24th Sept., once again at Henley Village Hall, as a Benefice function. Tickets are £4 for adults, £3 for children and can be obtained from Mrs. Punton or Mrs. Arthur. They will be sold on a "first come first served" basis but unlike the ITFC you do not have to be a Season Ticket Holder or have attended the last four!

We trust that the second issue of Contact in its new format has now been received by each village household and, of course, read avidly! Any comments will be welcomed. The writer could not implement and suggestions for improvement, but knows a man who can! The new Pew Weekly Letters are handed to attendees each Sunday morning and for those who are shy but interested, copies can be obtained from the plastic sleeve on the main door of the Church.

It will also have been noted that Church Hill tarmac was repaired by the County Council when doing other road repairs in the village. 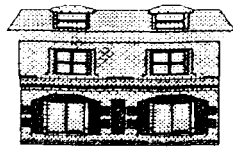

BABY SITTER AVAILABLE


Victoria Bloomfield is available for babysitting in the village.

Thank you to our Village Recorder, Ralph Taylor, for handing on the two articles on this page and the photos on page 14.

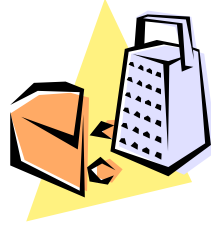

Lentil and Cheese Wedge

For five people:

110g lentils	20g marg. or butter
10g mixed herbs	An egg
225 ml water	60g chopped onions
Salt and pepper to taste	60g cheese
20g wholemeal breadcrumbs	



Method

Cook lentils in water until soft and water absorbed. Fry onions in butter till transparent. Combine all ingredients and press into greased flan tin. Bake at gas 5, 190°C, 375°F for 30 minutes. Garnish with thin slices of tomato. Serve hot with vegetables or cold with salad.

Your continued support is appreciated.

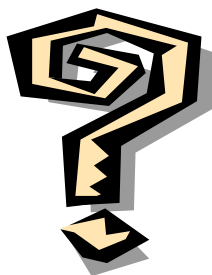
